Going Barefoot

I've gone from being the muddiest kid in the woods at Wilderness Awareness School's youth programs in 2004, to starting my own outdoor preschool in 2020. Since I can remember, my life has included WAS.

I have memories of making my own bow drill kit and building bonfires on Linne Doran, of helping to build the cob oven and the Malalo woodshed. I built shelters covered with ferns and slept in them overnight. I took incredible community school trips to Zion and the sand dunes, and I remember the profound impact Fire and Water Quest had on me. WAS was a safe haven for me, a place I connected to myself and to my indigeneity.

As soon as I was able to, I started volunteering at WAS summer camps and later became an instructor. It was also a place that I slowly started challenging; the connection and strength of self that WAS inspired in me helped me find my voice when I noticed injustices.

After being heard and acknowledged by staff, I started to speak out about my experiences and the inequity I faced at WAS. They responded with care by creating an Equity Council, starting diversity training at summer camps, requiring a level of knowledge around equity for staff, and hiring more diverse people. Through speaking up, I became more confident and my desire to take on injustice in nature connection deepened.

I became as fierce a protector of justice as I was of nature, all while working with young children to share the beauty of this world.

After graduating college this spring with an Environmental Science degree, I had one major hope in mind: to spread love, justice, and connection to the natural world. During this time of pandemic and lockdown, I realized that so many children were stuck indoors without the ability to engage with the world, have adventures, or play with other children. Children who live in the city have even less access to outdoor experiences. So I created my own preschool in North Seattle, **Barefoot Nature Explorers, with a fellow WAS** alum.

Being with these kids reminds me to continue to prioritize play, connection, and curiosity. I've started my school with a scholarship fund for students of color and based it in North Seattle for marginalized students to have access to nature. We start every day with gratitude about the Indigenous people who tend the land, and tell the students stories that center women and people of color. I can say with certainty that I would never have had the knowledge, experience, strength, or confidence to start a preschool if it hadn't been for my years at Wilderness Awareness School.




